Next Steps Discussion: (40 minutes) • Research and identify support for resource parents Research and review next steps regarding youth face to face contacts

The workgroup's qualitative case review found for the incidents that have happened there were some that had interventions in place already and some where interventions with the resource family may have prevented the maltreatment.

To consider:

- Resource parents are trained, but the understanding and/or maintaining of the information might not occur and needs ongoing coaching/support
- How early on in their certification, were the resource parents placed as caregivers? Did they have the chance or opportunity to get properly trained?
- Are our resource parents supported enough by CPS? The child's social worker is primary source of support.
- Do we have conversation with caregivers such as examples of the certain kinds of issues or maltreatments that we see in homes?
 - o An agreement is provided to and discussed with the caregivers re: what is expected of them
 - o But, it might be a good idea to provide certain issues or maltreatments/data in Prudent Parent Standards training
 - Non-related extended family members (NREFM) sometimes do not understand the trauma that the youth have endured, so caring for them is difficult
- Continue to have ongoing check ins and contacts with caregivers
 - Check in with caregivers annually, unless a "triggering" event
 - Caregivers are required to participant in 12 hours of training annually
- It might be nice to look over incidents/referrals quarterly instead of annually in order to determine if the incident is substantiated, also it cuts back on work at the end of the year
 - Less cases to look into per staff member (for accuracy)

Next Steps:

Arobia to include data re: maltreatment in foster care in training on Prudent Parent standards. Goal: to help make the connection between prudent parent decisions and safety for children in care.

CPS will begin to include the CFSR data in new hire cohort training. Will cover all outcome measures, including S1 maltreatment in foster care. Goal: help make connections between practice and outcomes for children and families. Highlight importance of social workers have conversations with resource parents about decision-making and what supports resource parents need.

Workgroup will begin quarterly case reviews of incidents of maltreatment in foster care in prior quarter. Goal: to look for trends and ongoing ways to decrease these occurrences, and catch any inaccuracies of maltreatment in foster care.
